### **7) Recognition**

The College is affiliated to Kavikulguru Kalidas sansrit University, Ramtek and is recognised by The Government of Maharashtra and their Social Welfare Department, Ministry of Social Justice.

### **8) Duration**

The MSW Course is of two years i.e., four semesters, with one month's Block Placement after completion of second year (i.e., IV semester) Final Examination.

### **9) Eligibility for Admission**

A candidate shall be admitted to the first year of the Master of Social Work course who satisfies the following conditions:

She/he must have passed the **Bachelor's Degree Examination** in any faculty of this university or any other university recognized as equivalent, with at least 40% marks.

**OR**

She/he must have passed **P.G. Degree Examination** of this or any other university.

The degree of Master of Social Work shall be conferred on a candidate who has pursued a regular course of study consisting of two years (i.e., four semesters), and who has appeared and passed all the examinations prescribed for the Master of Social Work Course.

### **10) Other Conditions**

1. Being an intensive course of studies and field work, and with limited facilities available for field work, strictly limited admissions are permitted by the University. **Enrollment is limited to a maximum of 60 students per year.**
2. No student will be permitted to register for any other course, this being a full-time course.
3. No student will be permitted to take up part-time or full-time employment while studying for the Master of Social Work Course.

4. Medium of instruction is Marathi and it is assumed that candidates seeking admission have adequate knowledge of the English.

### **11) How to Apply:**

Applications should be made in prescribed form available at the online portal of kksu link given in the prospectus and contact to Shri. Dnyandeo Limbaji Tambare College, Tagadgaon Tq. Shirurkasar Dist. Beed and should be contact also Dnyaneshwari shikshan prasarak Mandal, Shahu Nagar, Beed also office located at Upon the Bank of Maharashtra, Nagar Naka Beed. Not later than the specified date for the purpose. Applications received later than the specified date will not be entertained.

At the time of the submission of Application form for Admission candidates will have to pay Rs. 200/- towards Registration Fees.

### **12) Selection Procedure**

No student shall be permitted to register for other course of this or any other University. Selection of students for admission to M.S.W. shall be made on merit at the qualifying examination only.

Additional marks for finalizing the Merit list shall be given to the Candidate as shown below, if a candidate has:

1. Passed B.S.W. – 10 Marks
2. Passed P.G. Degree Examination – 05 Marks
3. Participated in N.S.S. activities – 03 Marks
4. Participated University/State/National Level Sports event – 02 Marks
5. Participated in University/State/National Level Extra Curricular/cultural activities/music exam. Etc. – 02 Marks

**A)** Preference shall be given to the students of Beed district and Marathwada Region. Rural students shall also be given preference on priority basis for admission to M.S.W.

### **13) Award of Division**

1. A candidate who secures 50% or more but less than 60% of the aggregate marks prescribed for the course of two years i.e. four semesters shall be awarded second division.
2. A candidate who secures 60% or more of the aggregate marks prescribed for the course of two years i.e. four semesters shall be awarded first division.

3. For both the first year and second year a candidate must obtain at least 40% in each subject and 50% of the aggregate marks. The marks of these examinations (i.e. two semesters of first year and semesters of second year) shall be counted together for a place in a list of the final Master of Social Work Examinations.
4. The Division shall be decided on the aggregate total of marks obtained in theory, written papers, social work practical, project report and viva-voce and all internal and external heads of assessment.
5. A student failing in Social Work practical at M.S.W. first year (examination i.e. after counting together the marks of first and second semesters) or M.S.W. second year examination (i.e. after counting the marks of third and fourth semesters) but passing in theory examinations shall be exempted from theory examinations while reappearing at the same examinations.

Such student shall be assigned a faculty member for various activities of Social Work practical and she/he shall complete the Social Work practical along with other regular students after paying a fee for Social Work practical and examinations.

6. A student failing in the theory at the Master of Social Work first year or in subsequent years, but passing in Social Work practical, shall be exempted from Social Work practical while reappearing at the same examinations as an ex-student.

#### **14) Class Room Attendance**

Students to be eligible to appear for theory examinations shall have to put in at least 75% attendance in the regular classroom. The students should be informed about their attendance at least once in a month. The assignment against short of attendance shall be given to those whose attendance for that particular month is less. The assignments may be Tutorial Books, Subject wise News Paper, Clippings and documentation, review of literature on various topics, review of article published, Seminar or any other work as decided by the principal in consultation with the faculty members. The assignments shall be completed within 10 days after the notice is displayed.

If the assignments are completed as per the instruction of the College the short of attendance for the particular period/month shall be treated as condoned.

However, at the end of each semester the classroom attendance shall not be less than 75%. In case the attendance at this stage too is less than 75%, the principal and faculty members shall decide regarding the assignments according to the short of attendance. Assignments may not be given to the students who are far below than the required attendance. The examination forms of such students shall not be sent to the University and if already sent, an undertaking from the student concerned shall be enclosed along with the form mentioning clearly that the student is aware that her/his attendance is less and if she/he does not fulfil the required percentage of attendance she/he shall not be allowed to appear for the examinations though her/his examination form is sent to the University.

Principal may condone a 10% of attendance on medical or other genuine grounds if she/he satisfies.

## **Attendance**

1. Every Student shall put in at least **90% attendance** in Orientation visits and Concurrent field work i.e. the activities of Social Work Practical. The students shall be informed about their attendance from time to time and at least once in month. In case the attendance is less, she/he shall be asked to attend extra visits.
2. Each student shall be assigned to a professionally trained member to the staff for Social Work Practical which includes activities like Orientation visits, Concurrent field work, Communication skills, field work Seminar/Workshop, Viva-voce, Rural Camp and Study Tour. Block Placement shall be non-graded activity.

Student shall be placed in appropriate agency/field for concurrent field work and she/he shall have to put in 15 hours per week and 20 days per semester.

## **16) Assessment**

### **i) Orientation Visits**

There shall be 10 orientation visits in first semester & 10 orientation visits in IIIrd semester.

### **ii) Concurrent Field Work**

1. There shall be **20 concurrent field work visits** during each semester, which shall carry **60 marks**. The concurrent field work shall be evaluated at least two times during each semester. Accordingly, an evaluation of 10 visits (i.e. 30 marks) shall be completed and shall be submitted by the concerned teacher within five days after 10th and 20th visit respectively.
2. A student shall be informed from time to time about her/his performance in the Concurrent field work and she/he shall be given sufficient opportunity for a better performance and a good success in practical. In case a student remains absent for concurrent field work he/she shall be given an opportunity for extra visits against the loss of regular visits. **Two extra visits shall be treated as equal to one regular visit** for the purpose. A student may be informed about her/his progress from time to time before final evaluation.
3. A student may also participate in evaluation process. An evaluation sheet for **'Self Assessment'** may be given to the students. Which may be comprised of knowledge, attitude and skills etc.

4. The maximum marks shall be on the basis of number of visits of concurrent field work. The marks shall be given according to the number of visits attended by the students.

### **iii) Assessment of Other Activities**

1. **Assessment of Seminar on field Work/Workshop**, Communication Skills and Internal viva-voce etc. shall be submitted immediately to the principal. In case a student remains absent at the time of internal evaluation of field work Seminar/Communication Skills/Viva-voce, she/he shall be given an opportunity to complete the same activity. **Number of marks to be deducted** for not attending the activity on the day and date notified shall be decided by the College.
2. A final statement of internal marks obtained by each student in each activity of Social Work Practical of each semester shall be signed by all the faculty members. A copy of such statement shall be enclosed along with a list of marks, which shall be sent to the University at the end of each semester. Generally, an evaluation shall be completed at least **15 days before the commencement of semester examination**.
3. After the orientation visits are finished each student shall be assigned to different teachers for different activities of Social Work Practical of whole year (i.e. two semesters) for the purpose of decentralization of internal marks.

### **Students must be allotted to teachers for following six activities of Social Work Practical of one year:**

1. Concurrent field work of 60 marks.
2. Viva-voce of 15 marks
3. Concurrent field work of 60 marks (Another semester)
4. Field work seminar / workshop of 20 marks
5. Communication skill of 20 marks
6. Viva-voce of 20 marks

Orientation visits, rural camp and study tour are to be assessed jointly by the respective teachers attending the said activities.

### **iv) Rural Camp & Study Tour**

Rural camp of not less than five days at M.S.W. First year and study Tour of not less than Five days at M.S.W. Second Year shall be arranged at the end of First and Third Semester respectively. **Both activities are compulsory**. The teachers attending the Rural Camp and Study Tour along with the students shall only assess these activities. The criterion shall be

decided by the staff members. If a student is not able to attend the said activities on genuine grounds, she/he shall be given the assignments against these activities.

**v) Block Placement**

A candidate shall also be required to complete one month's Block Placement within the 40 days after Examinations of last Semester are over.

**vi) Research Project**

Students for Research Project shall be equally allowed amongst all the teachers. Each Student shall be allotted to a teacher other than the Six Teachers supervising Six different activities of Second Year.

A student shall select a topic for Research Project in the beginning of Second Year (i.e. Third Semester) in consultation with Research Guide and the research project duly typed shall be submitted in the College on or before 1st March. The Research Project shall carry 100 Marks.

The Research Project shall be examined by both internal and External Examiner (50+50 Marks)

**vii) Viva-voce**

There shall be a viva-voce (external) on Research Project and Social Work Practical carrying 50 marks at the end of second year. The viva-voce shall be conducted on or before date declared by the university and mark list should be submitted directly to the University. In case a student remains absent on genuine grounds for external viva-voce, the arrangement of the viva-voce including TA/DA of the external examiner shall be made by the college under intimation to the University. However, mark list should be sent by the external examiner only.

**17) Medium of Instruction**

The medium of instruction shall be Marathi. Students may write answer papers in English or Marathi. Marathi version of question papers shall be supplied to the candidates. The students shall be encouraged to write answer papers in English instead of Marathi. The College shall take efforts to arrange for English improvement classes for which a visiting teacher may be invited.

**18) A.T.K.T.**

The candidate shall be allowed to join second year i.e. third semester subject to:

1. Passing in her/his Social Work Practical requirements.
2. Passing in theory examination. The candidates failing in not more than two theory papers of M.S.W. first year (i.e. first and second semesters) shall be allowed to keep terms for second year.

**The following shall be considered as separate heads of Passing:**

1. Theory written examinations (External Assessments)
2. Social Work Practical (Internal Assessments)
3. Research Project (Internal and External Assessments)

4. Viva-voce (External)

5. Information Technology (Theory-External & Practical-Internal)

A) There shall be a one-clock hour teaching for theory and practical of Information Technology and there shall be a combine passing for theory and practical.
